Ben Fellingham, the owner of Santaquin Barbershop, opened shop in November of 2019 right before the pandemic hit. Ben comes from a large family, having 7 siblings, and his wife of two years, Xochitl, are already on their way to their own large family with two little girls, Ali and Ari. While earning a degree in Art Education at UVU to become a High School teacher, he fell in love with barbering. He attended "The Barber School" in Murray, Utah. Shortly after barber school he owned a small beauty and grooming business with a team of barbers, cosmetologists, and make up-artists. Following that he worked for a cancer organization, traveling out of state and cutting models' hair. During his travels, he dreamt of owning his own barbershop.

Ben grew up on 20 acres out in Saratoga Springs, before it was an incorporated city. As a kid he was surrounded by alfalfa and horses, enjoying a childhood that allowed him to bring home any animals he found in the fields. He wanted to start his business in a similar community to his youth.

As he was searching for small communities for his shop, he found himself on Google Maps "in person view" scrolling down Santaquin Main Street. He noticed the For-Lease sign in front of Wall's Plaza, and immediately called the number and made an appointment. Shortly thereafter, he put down a deposit and started his business journey. He had no idea what the next five years would bring him, and still feels it's all happened so fast.

After a few years of going it alone, he is now grateful that last year he has a solid team of Barbers who love being part of the shop and the Santaquin community. He shares the same vision, and cherishes the relationships that we are making along the way. A barbershop is not just about a good haircut. Traditionally, the neighborhood barbershop is where people come to bond and learn from each other; where boys grow into men. As barbers in the community, Ben and his crew hear the details about everyone's lives. Ben recounted something he had been told: There are three people who can tell you about anyone in town - the Postmaster, the school receptionist, and the town Barber.

Ben tells me that "it has been an honor to serve the people of Santaguin these past years, and am personally grateful for all of the support that has been given from all the men, and, especially their wives, and the women who keep their men in check."

Mayor's Newsletter | June 2024



On the morning of Sunday, May the 5th, my cell phone rang with LT. Mike Wall alerting me to the terrible news of the loss of Sgt. Bill Hooser. This was a senseless act by a person who had no regard for life and targeted our officer and others in such a way that our lives as we live in Santaquin will be forever changed.

Within a short time, I was in the City's emergency operations center, set up in the public safety building. Upon arrival, I was met by most of the law enforcement chiefs or their representatives from Utah County. Others would soon arrive, and the wheels of

emergency operations were in order.

With immediate visits to Bill's family and ensuring all officers were gathering at the police station, it was humbling and strengthening to participate in how the wheels of the law enforcement community roll into action.

As citizens of our great city, it is important to know that every aspect of the wellbeing of our community, public safety personnel, and especially the family were in the hands of so many capable leaders. Within a very short time other communities took over our police shifts and allowed a grieving process and the process of ensuring every detail of Bill's care was underway.

With rain falling, along with occasional snow, the procession was planned and fully orchestrated that enabled a seven mile long contingent to travel somberly along I-15 and the 60-mile-long drive to the Medical Examiner's (ME) Office. I want every Santaquin citizen to know of the wonderful love and concern shown not only by our citizens, but that outreach of love that came from every mile along that 60-mile-long journey.

There were fire engines and people from every corner of our valleys standing along the freeway, holding flags, many saluting, and the traffic completely stopped at every on-ramp, allowing a respect-filled procession to arrive at our destination. The office of the state ME had lines on either side of the roadway, with police and fire officers standing at attention, to honor a man that many of them did not know.

None of us will truly know of the respect, honor, love, service, brotherhood, friendship, kindness, concern, as well as gratitude for these men and women that stand in harm's way to protect us in so many ways. These are things none of us will ever fully understand unless you are one of those that has put on the badge and sworn to serve and protect.

This past month we have witnessed one of the hardest things that has ever been done in our city and to one of our own. We have been grateful as a city to see the love pour out to our Law Enforcement from our citizens as well as from all over the State.

We have felt the difficulties of losing a great man that has been an integral part to the service of Santaquin. Bill is a great brother, friend, neighbor, father, and husband to our city family and to his family.

May we all remember the love and unity that has been shared through the days that followed Bill's passing. May we always carry that love and unity forward by taking care of our families, our neighbors, and each other.
